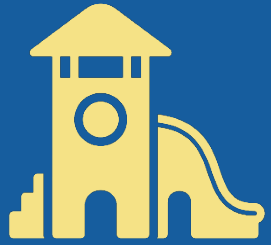

### **Assistance to Persons of Low-to-Moderate Income**

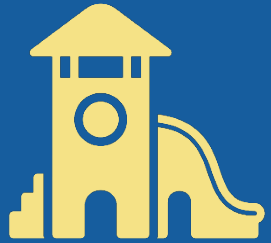
- Safe and decent affordable housing

# HOME INVESTMENT PARTNERSHIPS PROGRAM

## (HOME)

### Affordable Housing

- Commitment to providing decent, safe, and affordable housing for all.
- Alleviate the problems of severe rent burdens, homelessness, and deteriorating housing.
- Tailor housing strategies to meet local needs.
- Funds are used to leverage state and private funding to acquire, rehabilitate, and/or construct housing units.
- Depending on the particular project, funding and long-term affordability goals, these activities will be carried out by non-profit developers, for-profit developers, and non-profit Community Housing Development Organizations (CHDOs).

# EMERGENCY SOLUTIONS GRANT

## (ESG)

### Homeless Street Outreach

- Essential Services necessary to reach out to unsheltered homeless individuals and families, connect them with emergency shelter, housing, or critical services, and provide them with urgent, non-facility-based care.

### Emergency Shelter

- Renovation of a building to serve as an emergency shelter, essential Services for individuals and families in emergency shelter, shelter operations, relocation assistance.

### Homelessness Prevention

- Housing relocation and stabilization services and/or short and/or medium-term rental assistance necessary to prevent the individual or family from moving into an emergency shelter.

### Rapid Re-Housing

- Housing relocation and stabilization services and short and/or medium-term rental assistance as necessary to help individuals or families living in an emergency shelter or other place described in “homeless” definition move as quickly as possible into permanent housing and achieve stability in that housing.

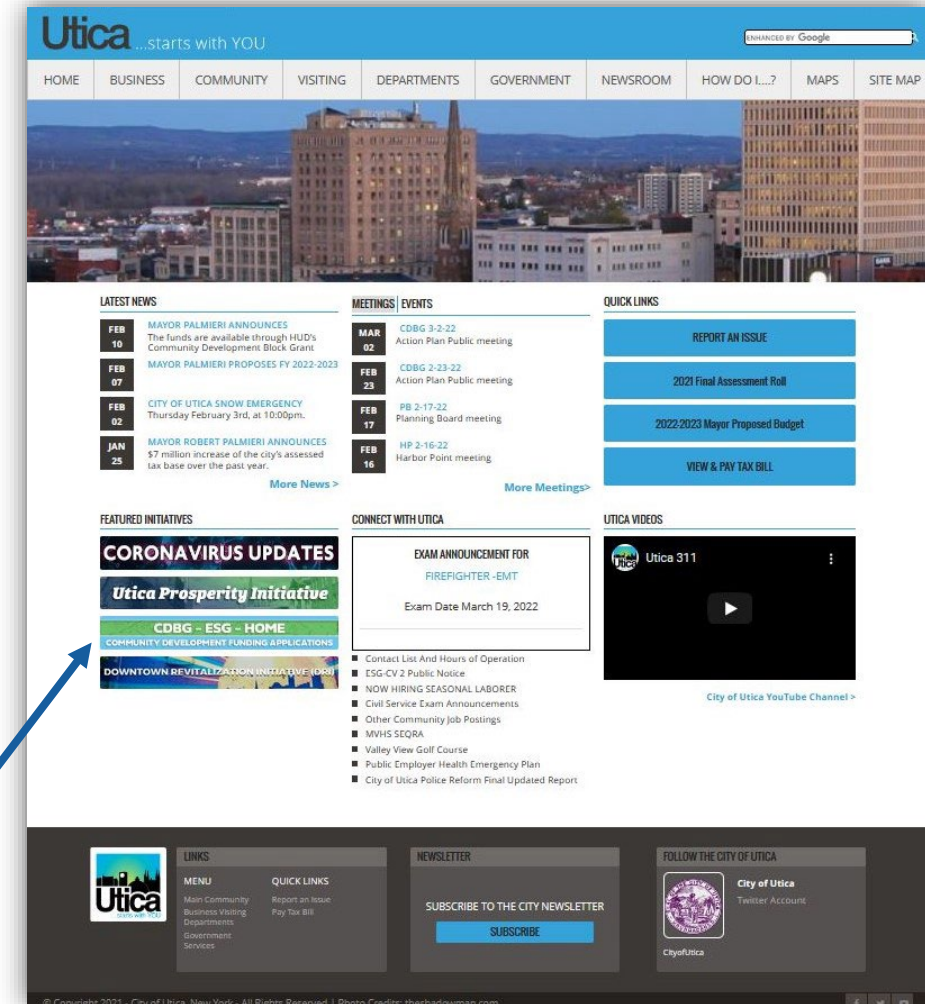
